Position Summary: The Transformation Network (TN), a National Science Foundation grant, is seeking a graduate research assistant to support a project on Indigenous community-engaged research for regional sustainability and climate resilience. Information on the TN can be found here: <https://transformimw.unm.edu/>

This graduate research assistant will work directly with Dr. Sharon Hausam, Dr. Lani Tsinnajinnie and the TN leadership team and will be supported by the UNM Transformation Network management and administration team at the University of New Mexico. The research assistantship includes a monthly stipend, tuition, and health insurance.

This project focuses on New Mexico's twenty-four federally recognized tribes.

The scope of work for the TN Indigenous Engagement and DEIJ (Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Justice) project includes three linked efforts focusing on Indigenous community-engaged research for regional sustainability and climate resilience:

- 1) Indigenous community information needs
- 2) Understanding of research with Indigenous peoples
- 3) Research examples and tools

Objectives associated with the first effort include:

- 1) understanding Indigenous community information needs, especially those related to regional sustainability and climate resilience, and

how they might be addressed through community-engaged and/or co-produced research or other approaches

2) establishing a foundation for Indigenous community-engaged research by establishing an Advisory Group that may serve as a community of practice in New Mexico.

The objective for the second effort is to improve researcher understanding of appropriate research methodologies with Indigenous communities, to advance ethical research that meets Indigenous community needs, especially research related to regional sustainability and climate resilience. The objective for the third effort is to develop tools to support ethical research with Indigenous communities that meets Indigenous community needs, especially research related to regional sustainability and climate resilience.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

This graduate student will assist in gathering, organizing, compiling, and summarizing relevant resources and literature around guidance and best practice examples of research with Indigenous communities; support focus groups and interviews; support the coordination and administration of the Advisory Group as needed; assist with note taking, transcription, and analysis of information; assist with creation of materials to disseminate information from these efforts; support a gap analysis; and other tasks as assigned.

Qualifications:

- Active enrollment in a UNM graduate program
- Excellent writing and communication skills
- A commitment to Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Justice

To be employed as a graduate assistant; the selected candidate must meet the following criteria:

- Formally admitted to a graduate program at the University of New Mexico.
- A graduate student in good standing as determined in the sole discretion of UNM administration.
- For Fall and Spring semester, maintain enrollment at the University of New Mexico for a minimum of 6 hours of course work, thesis, or dissertation hours that count toward the graduate degree.
- A 3.0 grade point average in graduate coursework each semester.
- Within the time limit, as specified in the UNM Graduate Catalog, for completion of the degree sought.

The ideal candidates will have experience with community-based participatory research or community-focused engagement approaches, working with New Mexico Tribal communities, an understanding of water and land resource issues in the Southwest, experience with sustainability and regional resilience research, an ability to build trust and rapport with community partners, excellent attention to detail, and the ability to work both independently and as part of a larger

research team. Applicants from underserved communities are particularly encouraged to apply.
